

1. The story so far



Imports from the EU rose a little in Q4



The EU imposed changes from Day 1

- The EU has implemented border measures on UK exports from Jan 2021 (eg: SPS checks on food)
- The UK is implementing change in stages over
 Jan Jul 2021, with further development later



Outbound movement is mostly OK

- IT systems are working
 - Some issues with Irish customs
- UK government is upbeat re outbound traffic flows
 - Not everyone agrees!
 - System not tested under stress
- Long distance sea freight faces other challenges:
 - Lack of containers
 - Low capacity, high cost



Focus is switching to inbound movement

- Little is known about readiness of EU businesses for new UK border regulations
- The UK government is providing guidance, but businesses should reach out to partners in the EU



Financial support is available

- Grants to help prep for changes to imports:

 - Recruitment
 - **Training**
- Scheme is administered by PWC
- Pool of money is starting to run out!



UK shellfish exports to **EU** are blocked

- The EU does not allow imports of untreated shellfish from "3rd countries"
- The European Commission has therefore blocked imports of untreated UK shellfish



Underloved fish have been renamed

- Megrim now called "Cornish Sole"
- Spider Crab now called "Cornish King Crab"



Checks at NI ports were suspended in Feb

- Checks on GB animal products at Belfast and Larne halted on 01st Feb
- Security has been strengthened and checks resumed on 10th Feb



Article 16 implemented (sort of)

"If the application of this Protocol leads to serious economic, societal or environmental difficulties that are liable to persist, or to diversion of trade, the Union or the United Kingdom may unilaterally take appropriate safeguard measures."



Food supply to NI has been disrupted

- Poor food availability was reported in NI in early 2021
- Several causes have been suggested, incl weather
- More recently, availability seems to have improved



GB - NI supply chain challenges

- **Border readiness**
 - Some temporary concessions on agri-food movements
- Groupage
- Tariff liability



Groupage solutions for NI

Consolidation model

- Goods assembled at central location
- Goods certified as border ready and sealed for dispatch

Linear model

- Haulier collects sub-loads en route to port
- Sub-loads are certified and sealed individually
- Complete load is then certified and sealed for dispatch



Groupage solutions for Ireland

- Groupage solutions were developed for GB / NI trade
- The solutions are currently being trialed for GB / Ireland trade
- If successful, solutions could be extended to the rest of the EU




Possible tariff solutions

- Common Transit Convention (CTC)
 - Some users struggling with NCTS IT system – refer to government advice on closing transit movements
- Returned Goods Relief (RGR)

Next steps on EU-UK transition

Mar 2021

Advanced testing for Stage II of UK border arrangements

Selected businesses will be involved

01 Apr 2021

Stage II of UK Border Operating Model (BOM) implemented

Imports of all agrifood products must be pre-notified

Some physical checks will occur, away from the border

01 Jul 2021

Stage III of UK Border **Operating Model** (BOM) implemented

Checks on imports will be expanded and will occur at the UK border

Complete customs declarations will be needed, no deferment

UK tariffs, where applicable, must be paid at time of import

New EHCs needed for exports to EU

- Current EHCs not valid from 21 Apr 2021
- New EHCs must be used awaiting more info
- Some items that do not need EHCs now will do so
- UK may also require new EHCs – policy not clear



Next steps for Northern Ireland

22 Feb 2021

Certification of "prohibited and restricted" goods begins

Special P&R EHCs must be used, signed by an official vet

Special labelling rules will also apply – packs must specify NI sale only

28 Feb 2021

Frontier Transit Doc needed to obtain Goods Movement Reference

This document available from Trader Support Service (TSS)

01 Apr 2021

End of "grace period" for supermarkets and their suppliers

After this, all shipments of POAO from GB to NI will need EHCs 30 Jun 2021


End of special concession on "prohibited and restricted" goods

After this, certain POAO (eg: sausages) cannot be sent from GB to NI in chilled form

Timings may change – wait for official updates


Completed this week

Will EU Exit mean deep change?


- Current UK grocery supply chain was developed within EU

- Will this overcome "inertia" and drive system change?



















- Cooking from scratch more (65%)




- Buying products on promotion (59%)

- Buying from reduced to clear (34%)




Half believe EU exit has led to rising food and grocery prices

Impact of the UK leaving the EU (%)




Concerns about EU Exit have declined




EU Exit leading to demand for British and local food




EU Exit <u>may</u> encourage me to buy more British or locally sourced food Dec'20
